Respect, Responsibility, and Results are our Core Values!

Students can behave in ways that support learning and contribute to a positive culture of effort, respect, responsibility, and results, or they can behave in ways that interfere with learning and diminish our positive community environment. The yellow and pink sections that you see below address those behaviors that interfere with our values of respect, responsibility and results.

The “Green” section of the rubric that is below addresses behaviors that support learning and contribute to a positive culture of effort, respect, responsibility, and results. Every day, all students act in ways that make a positive impact on themselves and others, and make our community a better place.

Developing a “Green” portion of our rubric involves a collaboration of staff people, students, and parents/care givers. This is a work in progress which began in 2009-2010, so please let us know if you have any ideas for additional ways in which we can help all students to be the best they can be, which allows Wilson to be the best it can be!

In the meantime, there are plenty of ways in which the “Green” portion of the rubric comes alive every day. On the green pages that follow there are a few examples of the ways in which students can and do exhibit positive behaviors, along with outlines of some of the ways in which these excellent efforts are recognized and acknowledged, and sometimes even rewarded!

<p>Examples of Respect</p> <p>Remember, these are just a few examples.</p> <p>There are many more ways in which to demonstrate respect in our school</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Patiently help a class/groupmate who has difficulty on a class assignment • Give feedback in a respectful and constructive manner • Discourage unkind talk if others start • Offer someone a seat in the cafeteria • Raise your hand before speaking/Listen when others speak 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Student feels good that someone cared enough to help out • YOU feel good about it (and you learn more when you help others)! • People don't have to worry about unkind words being said about them or others • Someone may help you when you need it! • Everyone learns more and feels respected 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Classmates may want to work/sit with you more often because they know you will be kind/helpful • Students or staff may thank you • You may be nominated for Citizen of the Month or Wildcat of the Month • Student may receive a raffle ticket in the cafeteria 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Leadership role in the classroom or school • You may be chosen as Citizen of the Month or Wildcat of the Month which means: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -name read during morning announcements -name put on school website -You come to office to receive award certificate -name is posted in main hallway or gym • You may win a snack or lunch outside with friends

<p>Examples of Responsibility</p> <p>Remember, these are just a few examples.</p> <p>There are many more ways in which to demonstrate responsibility in our school</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Prepared for class with all materials ready (includes changing for PE) • In seat, on time, quietly ready to learn • You actively and responsibly participate in all class lessons and activities 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You are ready to learn immediately; no wasted time or missed information • Everyone can hear teacher and learn • You support your own learning and others 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Your teacher may thank you individually or the whole class if everyone demonstrates responsibility • You may be nominated for Student Council 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Choice of activity for individuals or full class <p>Examples: movie day hat day PE activity choice</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You may be asked to join the Principal's Advisory Group • You may be elected to Student Council from your homeroom
<p>Examples of Effort</p> <p>Remember, these are just a few examples.</p> <p>There are many more ways in which to demonstrate effort in our school</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You complete your homework every day • You complete your classwork every class • You ask for help when you need it • You stay after school for help preparing for a test re-take 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You learn more! • Your grades improve! • You are proud of your efforts! • Your family is proud of your efforts! 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • You may be listed on the Honor Roll (all grades are B- or better) • You may be listed on the High Honors Roll (all grades are A-or better) • You may be listed on the Improvement Honor Roll (at least one core grade improved while maintaining other grades) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Names are printed in the paper. • Letters go home to parents/caregivers • Class privileges for students who are up-to-date (activity choice, movies, etc.)
